Minutes of the Town Council Meeting
Held on December 9, 2025

CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

The meeting was called to order at 09:30 AM in the Town Council Chambers.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Town Clerk Churney led the invocation, and Council President Lindsay led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF CONSENT AGENDA

Council Member Araskog requested that items 11, 12, 14, 15, and 19 be removed from the consent agenda for discussion.

Council Member Cooney requested that item 9 be removed from the consent agenda for discussion.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council President Pro Tem Crampton to approve the amended consent agenda. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

Council Member Cooney said the new look of the Police vehicles took the community by surprise. He noted that police vehicles are one of the most visible representations of the community's brand. The change saddened him, and he felt that in the future, the Town Council should be part of any discussion involving the rebranding of something so publicly visible.

Council Member Moran thought the new police vehicles resembled those of private security companies. She also noted that she had not noticed any introduction of the new look to the public.

Chief Caristo noted that the town had saved money with new colors. He stated that a committee had been assigned to develop the design.

Council Member Araskog preferred this color.

A motion was made by Council Member Cooney and seconded by Council Member Araskog to approve Resolution No. 168-2025. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

10. **169-2025** A Resolution of the Town Council of the Town of Palm Beach, Palm Beach County, Florida, approving a purchase order to Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. in amount of \$194,800, approving a contingency in the amount of \$29,220 and approving

a project budget in the amount of \$224,020 for Design Phase Services, Permitting Services and Bid Phase Services for the E08 and E-21 Ejector Stations.

11. **171-2025** A Resolution of the Town Council of the Town of Palm Beach, Palm Beach County, Florida, approving the award of ITB No. 2026-001, D-17 Stormwater Pump Station and E-13 Wastewater Pump Station Rehabilitation to Hinterland Group, Inc. in the amount of \$4,443,000, approving a contingency in the amount of \$888,600 and approving a project budget in the amount of \$5,331,600

Council Member Araskog asked to pull items 11 & 12 due to the expense of the two resolutions.

Julie Parham explained the expenditures.

Council Member Araskog mentioned that this is critical for resiliency and rising waters.

Council Member Cooney noted that there was no visual change, and Ms. Parham confirmed the same.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council Member Cooney to approve Resolution No. 171-2025. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

12. **173-2025** A Resolution of the Town Council of the Town of Palm Beach, Palm Beach County, Florida, approving a purchase order to Mock, Roos & Associates, Inc. \$393,920, approving a contingency in the amount of \$59,088 and approving a project budget in the amount of \$453,008 for Construction Phase Services for D-17 and E-13 Wastewater Pump Station Rehabilitation Construction

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council President Pro Tem Crampton to approve Resolution No. 173-2025. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

13. Request to Hear Proposed Ordinance No. 033-2025, prior to 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, December 10, 2025, Town Council Development Review Meeting agenda.

14. Acceptance of Department of Homeland Security Grant Funds

Council Member Araskog wanted to ensure that the Town of Palm Beach Police Department would not target individuals or pursue them.

Chief Caristo stated that the Police Department would be proactive but would not target or participate in any raids.

Mr. Blouin added that nothing has changed operationally since 1989, when he began his tenure with the town.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council Member Moran to

approve the acceptance of Department of Homeland Security Grant Funds. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

15. Acceptance of Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) Grant Funds

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council Member Moran to approve the acceptance of Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) Grant Funds. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Town Clerk Churney announced the following changes to the agenda: the addition of the US Polo Marathon – December 13 and 14, 2025, the addition of ZON-24-0043 (COA-24-0018) 100, 101, 102, & 103 FOUR ARTS PLZ –The Society of the Four Arts - Discussion and Direction Regarding Proposed Construction Screening & Temporary Directional Signage, and the addition of a discussion regarding the March 2026 Meeting Dates.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council Member Cooney to approve the amended agenda. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

COMMENTS

20. MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL MEMBERS

Mayor Moore announced the following December Milestones: 10 years of service for Joshua Stewart (PW) and 20 years of service for Michael Messner (FR). The mayor highlighted several key updates, including the extension of 2025 parking sticker usage into early 2026 while the Town transitions to a new parking software system, and the implementation of revised construction and landscaping hours designed to reduce traffic impacts during peak season. She also reminded residents that car carriers are prohibited from loading or unloading vehicles anywhere within the town limits, with violations subject to enforcement by Code. Finally, she expressed deep appreciation for the Town staff, acknowledging the continued success of the Mayor's General Employee Appreciation Fund, which provides annual bonuses and reflects the community's strong support for the Town's dedicated general employees. She reminded everyone to RSVP for the Palm Beach Chamber Breakfast on December 17, 2025, at 7:30 a.m. She also thanked the Police and Fire Foundation, Chief Caristo, and Chief Baker for a successful Public Safety Day.

Council Member Moran was happy to be nominated and running unopposed. She stated she would continue to work hard for the Town.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton thanked everyone for their good wishes to his wife, Kathleen. He asked Mr. Brazil about the town's plan for trees. Mr. Brazil responded that staff is working with an arborist to determine where new trees will thrive, and a master plan will be

developed for presentation to the Town Council.

Council Member Araskog thanked Chief Caristo and Chief Baker for a successful Public Safety Day. It was a great event, especially for children. Happy Hanukkah, Merry Christmas, and Happy Holidays. Council Member Araskog would like to revisit the topic of generators on roofs for next month. She congratulated Council Member Moran and stated she looked forward to working with her on the Council for another two years. She also said she was looking forward to working with Nicki McDonald and extended good luck to other participants in the election.

Council Member Cooney stated that the public safety event was fantastic! He thanked everyone who was involved in the event. The Worth Avenue tree lighting was also a nice event, and he noticed that public safety was great at that event. He asked Mr. Brazil about patches, noting that some located on the north end are starting to sink. Mr. Brazil stated he would take care of them.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton acknowledged the fire rescue and the great job they did in responding when his wife had an incident. Both Chiefs do a great job taking care of Town.

Council Member Araskog thanked the employees for attending the public safety event on their day off. She noticed people putting up signs in the right-of-way, which is not allowed. Mr. Brazil stated that someone had taken care of the signs before the staff arrived.

Council President Lindsay wished everyone a Happy Hanukkah, Merry Christmas, and Happy Holidays. She also recognized and thanked public safety staff.

21. PUBLIC - 3 MINUTE LIMIT

Bill Mays, 1701 S Flagler Drive, had some complaints about noise from airplanes. He asked why, when President Trump is not in town, air traffic cannot return to normal, and when the President is in town, why can't the flight paths be altered? He stated that he was also speaking on behalf of his neighbors. Mayor Moore responded that Palm Beach residents also must live with the aircraft noise, and the FAA, along with the Secret Service, is responsible for making those decisions as a matter of national security. Council Member Araskog suggested writing letters. Mr. Blouin agreed with Mayor Moore and Council Member Araskog, further confirming that the town has no control over air traffic patterns or noise. Council President Pro Tem Crampton sits on the Air Noise Committee, and a meeting is scheduled for Thursday at 1:30 p.m. in the Airport Administrative Offices. He encouraged Mr. Mays to attend and make comments on the record.

Anthony Clarke Smith, 235 Sunrise Avenue, discussed the opening of Root Avenue. He encouraged any suggestions that would help open the avenue. He also discussed the Clarke Avenue Beach easement. He noted that no structures were to be constructed on that beach. He suggested this be a point of discussion in February, asserting that the property belongs to the Town of Palm Beach.

Allison Irwin Held, 167 Root Trail, brought up concerns about the beach access area located at Root Beach. She stated that the beach access was closed in October due to concerns about erosion, which no longer exist. She requested an explanation of how long the access would be restricted. Mr. Brazil stated that the beach gate was locked because it was unsafe. He recommended keeping the gate locked due to the unsafe conditions.

Diane Buehler, Friends of Palm Beach, provided an update on progress made by volunteers. She also reported on new educational signs for sea turtles. She announced an upcoming community clean-up event.

GENERAL BUSINESS

22. Presentation from Amelia Jadoo, Executive Director, Palm Beach County League of Cities

Mayor Moore introduced Amelia Jadoo, Executive Director of Palm Beach County League of Cities.

Ms. Jadoo stated that she had been onboard for two months and provided an overview of the activities and representation being provided by the Palm Beach County League of Cities on behalf of Palm Beach municipalities. She stated they would be representing the collective interests that are impacting Palm Beach cities, including property taxes.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton encouraged Ms. Jadoo to return and provide the Town Council with an update on the tax issues.

Council Member Araskog said it would be essential to educate residents about the unintended consequences associated with a change to property taxes.

Mayor Moore commented that the impact would be less significant to the Town of Palm Beach than to other communities of a lesser economic status.

Council Member Moran congratulated Ms. Jadoo on her new position and thanked her for the update.

Mr. Blouin noted that there was a good video presentation by Palm Beach County regarding the legislative bills, and staff would distribute the presentation to Town Council members.

23. Appointments to the Shore Protection Board

The following residents presented their application and qualifications for the Shore Protection Board openings and answered all questions: Warren Belmar, Tim Cohan, Austin Fragomen, Page Lee Hufty, Tim O'Hara, and Joel Zylstra.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council Member Moran to appoint Tim Cohan, Austin Fragomen, and Joel Zylstra as regular members of the Shore Protection Board. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

24. 161-2025 A Resolution of the Town Council of the Town Of Palm Beach, Palm Beach County, Florida, Town Right of Way Manual Revisions

Town Engineer Patricia Strayer provided the information on the resolution and read it by title.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council President Pro Tem Crampton to approve Resolution 161-2025. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

25. Utility Locate Requirements

Assistant Director of Public Works Jason Debrincat presented information from the 811 and State of Florida websites. He explained the process of utility locate requirements, noting that a municipality may not modify the process.

Council Member Araskog asked what happens when a utility cannot be located. Mr. Debrincat responded. She asked about the penalty for violations. Mr. Debrincat responded that the penalty is spelled out in the statute, and it is significant. She asked if the town charges any fees in relation to utility locates. Mr. Debrincat stated that the town has one employee who performs utility locates. He said the town is not allowed to charge a fee.

Council Member Moran was impressed with the amount of work completed by Public Works. She suggested establishing an academy to educate residents about the various projects undertaken by the Public Works department.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton thanked Mr. Debrincat for the presentation and inquired about the frequency of system failures. Mr. Debrincat said that with this program, the system failures are minimal.

Council President Lindsay noted that she had requested that this item be added to the agenda because painted marks on the pavement last a long time. Mr. Debrincat stated that the paint lasts 30 days, but Mr. Brazil noted that the paint is sometimes refreshed after 30 days. She asked if flags or pins could be used instead of paint. Mr. Debrincat responded.

Council Member Cooney asked about the area of the markings, and Mr. Debrincat explained the process for marking utilities.

Council Member Araskog asked if the town could require that markings be removed upon project completion. Messrs. Brazil and Blouin stated that the State Statute does not allow a municipality to remove any markings.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

26. MATTERS PULLED FROM CONSENT AGENDA

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- 27. 160-2025** A Resolution of the Town Council of the Town of Palm Beach, Palm Beach County, Florida, Adopting a Donor Recognition and Signage Policy; providing for an effective date;

Carolyn Stone presented the Resolution and answered questions.

Council Member Moran thanked Ms. Stone; she thought it was well done and that the change

would benefit the town.

Council Member Araskog asked for a few amendments to the policy. Ms. Stone reviewed three amendments to the policy. She stated that the suggestions considered for the policy were: 1) to add in the definitions section, the naming rights revocation definition; 2) under Section 7, language regarding naming rights revocation definition; and 3) under public disclosure, addition of "according to public records laws."

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton commended Ms. Stone on the process and the product.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council President Pro Tem Crampton to approve Resolution No. 160-2025, with the modifications to the policy outlined by the Town Council. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

28. Town-Wide Undergrounding Project - Review of Project and Dashboard, Summary of Project Status

Ms. Strayer stated there were some very bright lights on Barton that were installed in error. That issue will be addressed in the next couple of weeks. Mayor Moore said it was a difference in the consistency of the lighting. Ms. Strayer noted that shades could be installed to protect the residents from the light if necessary.

Council Member Cooney inquired about the new fixtures that shine light into properties. And Ms. Strayer said that Florida Power and Light has agreed to shade the back side of the lights.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton asked if anything could be done to improve the appearance of the streets, as the quality of the roads in areas that have not been undergrounded needs attention. Mr. Brazil discussed another solution, but it is very messy. Ms. Strayer noted that there are only two areas that have not yet been undergrounded. She stated that staff would investigate the concerns expressed.

NEW BUSINESS

29. Image Pop Studio Filming Permit

Carolyn Stone introduced the item, requesting permission to conduct a fashion catalog shoot at various locations in town from January 26 to 28, with a rain date of January 19, 2026.

Representatives from Image Pop, Colleen Chambers, spoke about the request.

Council Member Moran asked if the requestors would consider earlier hours or doing the shoot out of season. Ms. Chambers and her husband responded that they were adhering to the policies but were amenable to being flexible.

Council Member Araskog inquired about the team and the activities that would occur during the shoot. Ms. Chambers responded, followed by Council Member Araskog, who asked about the brand. She stated that she appreciated the application but was not supportive in season due to

traffic.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton asked about the brand and where it would be seen. The representative stated that it would be displayed in the UK, as well as through social media and the internet.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

Council Member Cooney was not supportive of the request.

A motion was made by Council Member Cooney and seconded by Council Member Moran to deny the filming permit application. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

30. 170-2025 A Resolution of the Town Council of the Town Of Palm Beach, Palm Beach County, Florida, Approval for the Design Concept and to Accept a Donation to Construct a Beautification Project on the 100 Block of Seaview Avenue

Julie Parham presented the Seaview Ave beautification project. She reviewed the location of proposed trees and showed the different types of trees that could be used in the project. She noted that residents would provide donations to cover the costs of the project.

Mr. Blouin noted that maintenance of the trees would have an ongoing impact on the budget. Mr. Miracle stated he had conversations regarding the maintenance, and the staff would be discussing future maintenance with residents, making donations. He said there could possibly be a special assessment.

Mayor Moore liked the idea but acknowledged that there is a cost to maintain every tree. She liked the Christmas palm and thought this area of town could be beautified. She liked the concept but wanted to understand the cost.

Mr. Blouin stated it could be 64 trees. Mr. Brazil said the staff was seeking conceptual approval and would bring the details back to the town council.

Council Member Moran felt inclined to say no because the town was looking to institute a town beautification project with trees. She thought the town should be looked at holistically.

Council Member Cooney looked forward to a townwide tree program. He thought the town would be foolish not to accept the donation, and the town should find the cost for maintenance. The time is right, along with undergrounding. He preferred Christmas palms.

Council Member Moran said that she agreed with Council Member Cooney.

Council Member Araskog agreed with Council Member Cooney and preferred Christmas Palms since they provide more shade. She also inquired about the possibility of planting shade trees. Mr. Brazil stated that Public Works staff would work with the residents.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton thought additional details were needed. He agreed with Council Member Araskog regarding the possibility of looking at hardwood shade trees. He acknowledged the importance of townwide beautification.

Council President Lindsay agreed with Council Member Araskog that shade trees would be good for sidewalk areas.

Council Member Araskog asked if staff could come back with a different plan for the oceanside. Julie Parham responded.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment.

Annie Iorio, 131 Seaview Avenue, was concerned about the traffic and mentioned that there had been a suggestion for traffic calming in addition to beautification.

A motion was made by Council Member Cooney and seconded by Council President Pro Tem Crampton to approve Resolution No. 170-2025, and to return to the Town Council with a plan for the street. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

31. US Polo Marathon - December 13 and 14, 2025

Chief Caristo explained the event, which takes place primarily in West Palm Beach. Kirk Blouin stated that West Palm Beach requested a letter of no objection.

Council Member Moran asked what would happen if the town council did not provide a letter. Chief Caristo said they would still proceed with the event, but it would be documented. Council Member Moran asked if the town could inform residents whether it supports the event. Police Chief Caristo said there would be message boards to notify residents of delays.

Mayor Moore asked if Southern Blvd would be closed this weekend. Mr. Blouin said there had been no indication. He recalled there were substantial complaints last year.

There was a consensus from the Town Council to approve a letter of no objection, provided that it states the Mid-Town residents need to have access to, and be able to cross over, the Southern Bridge during the event.

32. Zoning Code Items – Quick Fix #15

32.1 2025 Comprehensive Plan EAR Policies that Require Placement into Chapter 134, Zoning. (Per Florida Statute)

Director of Planning, Zoning, and Building Wayne Bergman provided an overview.

Jennifer Hofmeister, Planner III, provided the ten amendments in the Comprehensive Plan.

Council Member Araskog raised a question about special exception uses and asked staff to look at the language with Ms. O'Connor. Ms. Hofmeister said she would make the change because it should be the existing approved.

Council Member Moran appreciated the presentation. She said that, regarding Royal Poinciana, she liked the way the buildings looked as if they belonged in Palm Beach, and she appreciated that it encouraged people to be more creative with their parking plans, possibly solving a lot of

problems. She really liked the non-singular approach.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

A motion was made by Council Member Cooney and seconded by Council President Pro Tem Crampton to direct the staff to return to the Town Council with an ordinance incorporating modifications to the Comprehensive Plan EAR. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

33. ZON-24-0043 (COA-24-0018) 100, 101, 102, & 103 FOUR ARTS PLZ –The Society of the Four Arts - Discussion and Direction Regarding Proposed Construction Screening & Temporary Directional Signage

Craig Hauschild, Civil Engineer, provided an overview of the Society of the Four Arts project and the rerouting of Lake Trail during construction.

Keith Spina, Spina O'Rourke + Partners, presented the architectural plans for construction screening and the Society of the Four Arts project.

Council Member Moran asked about the double screen. Ben Baffer of Suffolk Construction stated that the standard construction fence would be 6 feet in height around the entire perimeter of the project. The screen being discussed is located behind the construction fence, mounted on telephone poles, a couple of feet away.

Council Member Cooney liked the concept and liked the buildings on the screen.

Council President Pro Tem Crampton liked the screening.

Mr. Spina continued to discuss the signage and the temporary rerouting of the lake trail before the bridge.

Council Member Cooney asked about the right-of-way issues on Royal Palm Way. Mr. Hauschild discussed the impacts on the right-of-way on May 1. Council Member Cooney was not supportive of anything that would cause lane disruptions on Royal Palm Way during March, April, and May.

Council Member Araskog agreed with Council Member Cooney and thought the motion should state that they must follow the town code, which disallows them from starting before May. Mr. Brazil recommended that the motion be stated to allow Public Works to issue a right-of-way permit, and they will add those conditions.

Council Member Moran questioned the language included on the signage. She noted that she liked the way the signage was branded.

Council President Lindsay was unclear about the exit from the temporary location of the bike trail. Mr. Spina explained.

Mayor Moore was glad that the lake trail would not be moved.

Mr. Spina stated that he would like to return in April to discuss the construction details. It was decided that he would return in March.

Council President Lindsay called for public comment. No one indicated a desire to speak.

A motion was made by Council Member Cooney and seconded by Council Member Moran to allow the Public Works Department to issue right-of-way permits for construction screening in accordance with the town code. The motion was carried unanimously, 5-0.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

34. March 2026 Meeting Dates

The Town Council discussed rescheduling the March 2026 Town Council meeting dates due to the March 10, 2026, municipal election, staff onboarding constraints following the election, and multiple scheduling conflicts. The Council considered meeting dates both before and after the election, including early March (March 3-4, 4-5, and 5-6) and later dates in March (including the week of March 24). Staff advised that holding the meeting immediately after the election would limit the ability to onboard newly elected members properly and that earlier March dates were operationally preferred.

A motion was made by Council Member Araskog and seconded by Council Member Cooney to amend the March 2026 meeting dates to March 5, 2026, and March 6, 2025. The motion was carried 4-1, with Council Member Moran dissenting.

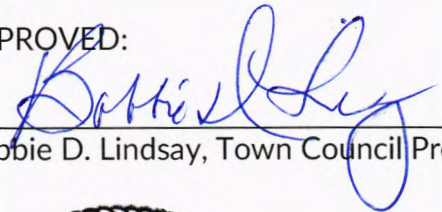

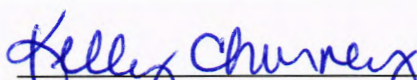
ADJOURNMENT
